# **VALUES-IN-ACTION PROGRAMME**

Kranji Food Rescue and Grocery Distribution is back for round two! Did you know Singapore threw away 637 million kilogrammes of food last year? That's the equivalent weight of about 1200 Airbus A380s! Food wastage has become a serious problem in Singapore over the years, accounting for 10% of the total waste generated in 2018. Kranji Secondary School has an ongoing collaboration with SG Food Rescue and Fei Yue Senior Activity Centre to do our part to tackle the problem of food wastage. This year, students from Secondary 2K4 organised a grocery distribution drive to distribute fruits and vegetables rescued by SG Food Rescue, to the elderly residents at Block 165A, Teck Whye Crescent. Students and residents discovered to their surprise that while the rescued fruits and vegetables may look "ugly", they were indeed still very edible and delicious when the "ugly" parts were removed! The students have definitely learnt a lot from this activity! The following are some excerpts from their reflections.



# ELECTIVE MODULES AND ADVANCED ELECTIVE MODULES

In April and July, our Secondary 2 and 3 Normal Technical students attended Elective Modules (EMs) at ITE Central and ITE West. The modules aim to provide students with a glimpse of what they can expect to learn in the various courses of study in ITE, so that they are better prepared when they join ITE after their secondary education. This year, the students attended EMs ranging from Practical Energy and Water Conservation and Mobile Robot in Mechatronics to Personal Finance and Social Media Content Development.

Our Secondary 3 Express and Normal Academic students were given the opportunity to extend what they have learnt in school through a variety of Elective Modules (EMs), such as Application Science in Forensics (offered by Singapore Polytechnic) and Robotics in a Mechatronic World (offered by Republic Polytechnic). The rich learning experience allowed our students to discover their interests so that they are able to make informed education and career choices in the future.

"Through the EM that we attended, my group acquired the basic knowledge and skills required to perform water audits and apply water conservation methods in residential buildings. We had the chance to design and build a mobile robot, making the learning experience fun and enjoyable. The EMs allowed students in the Normal Technical course to learn new things in an authentic setting, and we are thankful to the school for providing us with such a great learning opportunity."
